#### **LEGISLATIVE & REGULATORY UPDATE**

Happy New Year to the MLBC membership! I hope you all have a prosperous and productive 2019. Despite living in a time of uncertainty with the longest federal governmental shutdown in modern history, the MLBC membership has much to be happy about.

As was circulated recently, the issues for landmen created by the Dundics decision out of Ohio have been legislatively resolved. On December 19, 2018, the Ohio legislature passed Ohio S.B. 263, amending O.R.C. Section 4735.01 to add new exemptions to the definition of a "Real estate broker" under Ohio law, explicitly exempting contract and in-house landmen in the oil and gas industry from the real estate brokerage statutes for their lease-taking activities. However, to the extent that contract landmen are buying and selling fee oil and gas interests on behalf of a client, they would still need to hold a real estate brokerage license. We will continue to monitor the situation in Ohio and report on any further developments.

Also in Ohio, the Ohio Supreme Court decided a case affecting the Ohio Marketable Title Act, finding that a reference in the surface owner's chain of title to a prior royalty reservation was sufficient to preserve the separate, severed mineral ownership interest and that the act did not require specific reference to the book and page or date the original interest was created. (Blackstone v. Moore, 2017-Ohio-1639). The U. S. Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit decided Rogers v. SWEPI LP, --- Fed. Appx. --- (Case No. 18-3229, 6th Cir. 2018). In that case, the 6th Circuit was tasked with determining whether the proper remedy in a dispute between a landowner and an oil and gas lessee regarding the nature of their agreement should be heard by a federal court, or if the dispute should have first been subject to the lease's binding arbitration clause. In reviewing the issue, the Court determined that the landowner was attacking the contract as a whole and therefore arbitration was the proper remedy. The court went on to state that a limited attack on the arbitration clause itself may have been taken properly before a federal court, but that the landowner's claims were much broader than that, resulting in the need for arbitration.

On December 13, 2018 in Pennsylvania, the Department of Environmental Protection's (DEP) Air Quality Technical Advisory Committee met to discuss recently released draft regulations on air emissions from existing oil and gas sources. Though not yet finalized, the new regulations are designed to "curb direct emissions and leaks of volatile organic compounds from older well sites, storage tanks, and other oil and gas facilities." The Pennsylvania Supreme Court found in Snyder Brothers, Inc. v. Pa. Pub. Util. Comm'n, --- A.3d --- (Pa. 2018) that the Pennsylvania impact fee may be assessed against the producer under a vertical oil and gas well when the well averages 90,000 cubic feet of production of natural gas for even one month of the year.

# From Dundics to Senate Bill 263 and the Implications for Ohio Land Professionals

The graphic below is a short timeline of events from the date of the Ohio Supreme Court ruling in Dundics et al v. Eric Petroleum to the date when Senate Bill 263 becomes effective law. The information below will provide a short history on the past court decisions, how it impacts land professionals in Ohio and how the MLBC is planning to respond as a service to our members. As many of you are aware, the past few months offered a changing legal landscape for land professionals operating in the state of Ohio relating to licensing requirements. We now have a much clearer picture of the licensing and disclosure requirements as imposed by Senate Bill 263.

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#### A short timeline of events.

On September 25, 2018, the Ohio Supreme Court rendered a decision in Dundics et al. v. Eric Petroleum Corp., holding that land professionals who negotiate oil and gas leases must comply with the real estate broker's licensing requirements set forth in Ohio Revised Code section 4735 and would essentially require certain land professionals in Ohio to become licensed real estate brokers.

It should be noted that after the Dundics' decision, behind the scenes, representatives of American Association of Professional Landmen, alongside the Ohio Oil and Gas Association were working on language to draft a bill to remedy the situation created by the Dundics' decision. The result of these efforts, after much deliberation and negotiations, was Senate Bill 263.

On December 19, 2018, Governor Kasich signed in to law Senate Bill 263. In short, this law exempts oil and gas land professionals from the requirement of obtaining a real estate broker's license set forth in ORC 4735. Ultimately, this is a major win for Ohio landmen compared to the alternative of acquiring a real estate broker's license and the burdensome requirements associated therewith. Drew Romig, attorney with McDonald Hopkins and the Co-Chairman of the MLBC Legislative and Regulatory Committee, offered a concise explanation of Senate Bill 263 and its implications on land professionals in Ohio:

"Oil and gas land professionals are then exempted from the real estate brokers licensure requirements as long as they are either 'not engaged in the purchase or sale of a fee simple absolute interest in oil and gas,' or employed by the person, partnership, association, limited liability company, limited liability partnership, or corporation for which the oil and gas land professional is performing the oil and gas land professional's duties.' Importantly, it appears that independent, non-employee mineral brokers would fall outside of this exemption, and would still be required to obtain a real estate broker's license."

Unfortunately, it appears those most negatively impacted by this decision are independent land professionals who purchase fee simple absolute mineral interests in Ohio on behalf of a third party, as the language in Senate Bill 263 does not exempt the purchase of fee simple absolute mineral interests and thus would still require a real estate broker's license.

#### What Are the Registration and Disclosure Requirements for Ohio Land Professionals?

On March 19, 2019, Senate Bill 263 will become effective. The new law imposes requirements Ohio landmen should be aware of and are obligated to abide by; the requirements are detailed below, and the information has either been directly taken from the language within Senate Bill 263 or summarized from the text.

### From Dundics to Senate Bill 263 and the Implications for Ohio Land Professionals (continued)

1. Part HH (1A): Registers on an annual basis as an oil and gas land professional with the superintendent of real estate by such date specified and on a form approved by the superintendent.

- The form must include the applicants name and evidence he or she is a member of a national
  or local professional organization that has developed a set of standards of performance and
  ethics.
- Part HH (1B): Pays an annual fee not to exceed \$100.00.

2. At or prior to first contacting any landowner or other person with an interest in real estate for the purpose of engaging in the activities of an oil and gas land professional, and on a form approved by the superintendent, discloses to the landowner or other person all of the following:

- (a) oil and gas professionals name and address;
- (b) evidence of registration with superintendent and membership in national, state or local professional organization;
- (c) statement that the oil and gas land professional is not a licensed real estate broker
- (d) statement that the landowner may seek legal counsel in connection with any transaction with the oil and gas land professional;
- (e) statement that the oil and gas land professional is not representing the landowner or other person with an interest in real estate.

3. At or prior to entering into any agreements for the purpose of exploring for, transporting, producing, or developing oil and gas mineral interests including, but not limited to, oil and gas leases and pipeline easements with any landowner or other person with an interest in real estate, and on a form approved by the superintendent, discloses to the landowner or other person with an interest in real estate all of the following:

• The disclosure form must also include the information as detailed under #2 (a) through (e) described above

In summary, land professionals in Ohio will be required to annually register with the superintendent of real estate, provide a form to owners of real estate at or prior to first contact and also provide a form to the owner of real estate at or prior to entering into any agreements, with certain exemptions. Please refer to the website link at the bottom of the page to view Senate Bill 263 in its entirety.

#### MLBC's Response to Our Membership

The MLBC will continue to closely monitor the situation. As a result of the passing of Senate Bill 263 and its disclosure and registration requirements, the MLBC is holding a meeting for MLBC members and non-members who are impacted by the decision. We will be hosting Mr. Timothy M. McKeen, attorney and practice group leader of mineral title and energy real estate from Steptoe and Johnson PLLC.

The lunch meeting will be held at Undo's in St. Clairsville, Ohio on Thursday, February 28, 2019. In between now and then, hopefully, we will have a better idea of how landmen will obtain the required registration and disclosure forms and the process of registering.

In closing, MLBC members, AAPL members and all land professional operating in the Appalachian Basin and Ohio should be proud of the efforts of our national organization and everyone involved in expediting the response and drafting the legislation to protect the interests of all landmen and the land profession in Ohio.

### WVU Energy Land Management Association Partners With Pantry Plus More

Every semester, the WVU Energy Land Management student association undertakes a community service or volunteering group project. In past semesters they have participated in events like stream cleanups and trout stocking, trail construction at Coopers Rock State Park, and trail cleanups at the WVU Falling Run green space. This semester, we decided to go a different direction and partner with Pantry Plus More, a Monongalia food pantry tailored for school children in the county.

Working with Pantry Plus was a natural fit for our organization because it perfectly fit the main criteria we keep in mind when deciding projects: a problem that affects the greater Morgantown community. Pantry Plus is working to fight a problem that many assume doesn't exist, yet, the organization estimates that nearly 30% of students in the five schools they service in Monongalia county utilize the pantry.

With this in mind, ELMA reached out to Roark Sizemore, Pantry Plus More President, and invited him to a meeting to talk about the cause as well as distribute three 42-gallon blue barrels to be used as food collection containers. Roark explained the most sought after items are non-perishable kid-friendly foods, hygiene products including feminine hygiene items, school supplies, and clothing. The club then split into three teams competing to fill their barrel first.

Each group had a unique approach. One group decided to reach out to a local fitness club for permission to leave the barrel for donations. Another group reached out to a Kroger, and the third chose to task the group members to each collect items however they could and keep the barrel in a central location. In less than three weeks, each group was able to fill their barrel with foods that kids would appreciate including mac and cheese, breakfast bars, snacks, and more.

### MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

#### CHARLES HEILMANN, CPL

In honor of the MLBC's 60th Anniversary, the MLBC will be featuring the past presidents of the MLBC in our Member Spotlights in 2019. To kick that off, the MLBC is pleased to introduce Mr. Charles "Chuck" Heilmann CPL, in our February Member Spotlight of the MLBC Takeoff. Chuck is a respected and well-known figure in our organization and it was a real treat to catch up with him in our Past President Member Spotlight Q&A.

#### MLBC:

When were you President of our organization? What years did you serve in office?

#### **CHARLES HEILMANN:**

I served as President from June 2013 to June 2014, I officiated my first meeting on a Gateway Clipper cruise, August 8, 2013.

#### MLBC:

Are you still actively involved in the MLBC?

#### CH:

Since fulfilling my obligation as President Emeritus, my workload has been such that I have found little time to contribute. I just recently retired, so I'm willing and have time to spend helping in any way I can.

#### MLBC:

How has our organization changed over the years?

#### CH:

The biggest change is the number of members. I would estimate the membership numbered around one to two hundred when I joined in the fall of 1979. Sometime around my tenure as President, our membership peaked around 1,800. When I first joined the executive committee, we had one volunteer person (I wish I could remember her name) that took care of membership dues and dinner meeting reservations. This was all done by snail-mail, email, and phone. I guess you could throw a fax or two into that as well.

One of the first tasks I had with the MLBC was to computerize some of these tasks. I registered the domain MLBC-APPLORG and built the first website (it wasn't much) but with knowledge and know-how of our current President Emeritus, Jeremy Preston, a premier website was created. We now have the convenience to do almost all MLBC business online with a credit card.

Another BIG change in the MLBC is the opportunity to not only play golf, which by the way, I don't like. I've always said I would rather mow the grass than play. The MLBC now offers clay shooting as an option. Both events, enjoyed by most, have become charitable fundraisers; that is a good thing. I believe Aaron Yost can take credit for that.

#### MI BC:

Tell us a little bit about your career, your current position, past positions and some of your land-work experience.

#### CH:

I was out of high school and trying to find my way. I tried to join the U.S. Air Force right out of school but was disqualified due to some ear surgery as a youth. This was circa 1975 and the Vietnam war had just ended, and the Armed Forces were being picky. I took a factory job and was not at all happy working inside with a union.

Through another recruiter, I made a second run at the Air Force in 1979. While on my way to Columbus my Mom told me that a good friend of my Dad's, Mr. N. Ted Lee said that if I didn't make the cut this time, he had a "Land" job for me. I turned around on the median of I-77 and never looked back. While I feel a little bad that I did not serve my country, I feel I served in another way, keeping America moving with energy.

I started my career, thanks again to Mr. Lee, working in Mason County, WV for Mountaineer Landmen about three years. Mr. Lee bought our Mountaineer and started North Star. I worked for North Star until circa 1995 when I started my own brokerage. I ran under the name of C. E. Heilmann Land Services, then later changed the name to Land Matters of WV. I operated LMWV until the spring of 2009 when I took a job with a major Appalachian company as a Regional Land Manager. Three days before this interview, I retired, at least for a while. It is good for my soul to sit down and recall a land career that has spanned 40 years.

#### MEMBER SPOTLIGHT CONTINUED

#### CHARLES HEILMANN. CPL

#### MLBC:

Do you have a favorite land story, project, area of interest in the oil and gas industry?

#### CH:

So many and even more forgotten. Let me share one story that has always stuck in my mind.

Many years ago, as a field Landman staking wells and routing pipelines, I worked with a surveyor, who will go unnamed. We had just finished flagging an access road and staking a well. We had decided to walk out another way. When we got to the hardtop, we were walking and chatting, satisfied we had our chore done for the day. We walked for a little while when suddenly, a gunshot rang out! This was close, deafening. The surveyor had a loaded 357 revolver in his "fanny pack" with one shot under the hammer. When the strap broke the revolver dropped on hammer and discharged right between us. I thank God, to this day neither one of us was hit. I always wondered just how close one of us had come to dying that day.

My favorite land-work is title and organization of project records using databases and other digital formats.

#### MLBC:

What do you see happening in the future of oil and gas and in the Appalachian Basin?

#### CH:

Pipelines need to be finished. The Appalachian Basin can't expand until all the opposition to pipelines are dealt with and the industry prevails. We are in a bottleneck with supply in the ground and not enough capacity to transport it south and east.

#### **MLBC**:

If you could offer advice to a young land professional, or peer, what would you say?

#### CH:

No matter what you do in your career always treat people honestly. I sometimes did that to a fault. I'm not the one to tell people how to be gentle, but I always knew when I was not. I got really good at apologizing. In other words, my personality sometimes overtook a better, more gentle way of expressing myself.

Remember in the land business people are the most important and only asset. As I look back on my life and career, it's not "things" I'll miss, it's the people I have had the privilege to work for and with.

#### MLBC:

Are there any ways the MLBC can improve as an organization or by offering service to our members?

#### CH

I think the leadership has done a great job of providing educational opportunities to the membership. Keep doing what you have always done – educate the members.

#### **MLBC**:

Who has been your biggest influence/mentor? Tell us about he or she.

#### CH:

If I must pick one person in my career, it would be Mr. Tim Tonkin. It was with a very sad heart when Tim passed away about one year ago. I worked with Tim for the better part of 25 years. We didn't have a lot in common as far as hobbies but we both had a passion for land-work. He was the one to push me to get my CPL and involved in the MLBC.

#### MLBC:

How long have you been a member of the MLBC? How long have you held your CPL designation?

#### CH:

I join the MLBC in 1979 and the AAPL in 1980. I passed my CPL exam in 1998 and have maintained my certification through continuing education offered or sponsored largely by the MLBC/AAPL.

#### CH

### AAPL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

From Christa Dotson, RPL

On Sunday, December 9, 2018, the AAPL held its quarterly board meeting at the Hyatt Regency Resort and Spa in Lost Pines, Texas. The resort is located half an hour from Austin and was absolutely lovely. I was able to spend some time exploring both the resort and the city over the weekend, as it was my first trip to the area. After some sightseeing, it was all business for the board meeting on Sunday.

#### Legislative

The predominant discussion leading off the meeting was related to the issue of landman licensing in Ohio. At the time of the board meeting, legislation was pending to exempt landmen from the real estate licensing requirements mandated by the decision in the Dundics case. As reflected in the email blast from AAPL President Mike Curry to members on December 20, 2018, the legislation to exempt landmen from the real estate licensing requirement (but imposing a registration requirement) was passed and signed into law.

#### **AAPL** Headquarters

AAPL currently has 22 employees and plans to add a new Assistant Controller role. Additionally, there are 7 NAPE employees with one open role for NAPE BD Representative. The AAPL staff celebrated two anniversaries this quarter. Employees Drew Guntert, NAPE Operations Manager and Amanda Johnson, Controller, both celebrated 5-year work anniversaries this quarter.

AAPL financials are in good shape with the audit of all entities for the 2017-2018 fiscal year complete and an issuance of an unqualified opinion meaning that there were no material errors or omissions in AAPL's financials. The AAPL's Controller presented the 2019-2020 expense and capital draft budgets to the Finance Committee in November.

Other key accomplishments from AAPL staff and Committees last quarter include:

- AAPL published the 2018 Compensation Survey results in the November/December Landman Magazine.
- Annual Meeting preparations were finalized in regards to speakers, venue, printed program advertisements and registration.
- Contract Center was updated with new member pricing of \$250 annually effective January 15, 2019.



### MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

#### DOUGLAS RICHARDS. CPL

In honor of the MLBC's 60th Anniversary, the MLBC will be featuring the past presidents of the MLBC in our Member Spotlights in 2019. The MLBC is pleased to introduce Mr. Douglas Richards, CPL, in our February Member Spotlight of the MLBC Takeoff. Doug is admired and valued in our industry. It was an honor to catch up with Doug in our Past Presidents Member Spotlight Q&A.



#### **MLBC**:

When were you President of our organization? What years did you serve in office?

#### **DOUG RICHARDS:**

I served as President of MLBC 1979-1980 and was Secretary/Treasurer prior to that.

#### **MLBC**:

Are you still actively involved in the MLBC?

#### DR:

I retired in 2016 after 42 years in the land business and now reside in Venice, Florida. Due to the distance I am obviously unable to attend the meetings. But I always look forward to receiving "The Takeoff" and keeping up with the people and activities of the organization.

#### **MLBC**:

How has our organization changed over the years?

#### DR:

In many ways the MLBC is a very different organization than I remember in the 1970's. In those days the membership and meetings were often quite small. There were times that we could almost sit around a couple of card tables. Whatever money we had in the checking account was spent each month trying to pay for the dinners. In fact, there were times some of us had to take money out of our pockets to pay at the end of the evening.

Land-work today is highly dependent upon technology, making it more efficient, but unfortunately less relational. One of the most significant aspects of belonging to MLBC has always been the business and personal relationships available. Another rather recent development I see in the MLBC are the frequent charitable events undertaken. Giving back to those less fortunate is a commendable way to use the time and resources with which the association is blessed.

#### MLBC:

Tell us a little bit about your career, your current position, past positions and some of your land-work experience.

#### DR:

I started my land career in 1973 as an independent landman working for Consolidated Gas Supply Corporation (now Dominion) in central West Virginia. After leaving Consolidated, I spent three years with Hillman Coal Company as a hard rock landman. In 1977, I went to work for Quaker State as a staff/field landman working primarily West Virginia and Ohio. In 1979, I was hired as a staff landman at Delta Drilling Company (later named DeltaUS Corporation) in Pittsburgh. In 1981, I was promoted to District Land Manager. Kerr-McGee bought Delta in 1982, and I continued as District Land Manager until 1988 when Darryl Griwatz and I formed Honor Resources Company.

I served as President and later Sr. Vice President of Honor until my retirement in 2016. When we started the company, Darryl and I decided that Honor would not be the largest land brokerage in the Appalachian Basin, but the best. After 30 years and a lot of hard work, especially by Darryl, I believe we accomplished our goal.

Do you have a favorite land story, project, area of interest in the oil and gas industry?



### MEMBER SPOTLIGHT CONTINUED

#### DOUGLAS RICHARDS, CPL

#### DR:

I sometimes suggest to young landmen, especially field landmen, that they keep a journal of their activities. Some land stories remain part of you, but years pass and memories fade. As for projects, early in my career an older landman advised me to avoid pipeline right of way work for various reasons. I essentially took his advice until late in my career when I worked on a right of way for the construction of a large pipeline for Columbia Gas. I loved it and could hardly wait for the next project. I also especially enjoyed due diligence and title curative. One of the best things about being a land professional is the ability to learn and work so many different disciplines. In my career I have touched nearly all phases of land work, except Indian lands and offshore, both of which are in short supply in the Appalachian Basin.

#### **MLBC**:

What do you see happening in the future of oil and gas and in the Appalachian Basin?

#### DR:

The Appalachian Basin is the oldest and largest basin in the United States. There were times so many of us wondered about the future of oil and gas here. Then in 2004 Range Resources drilled the Renz #1, the first commercial Marcellus Shale well in Washington County, Pennsylvania. Overnight our world changed! The oil and gas industry is highly cyclical. We should never be so complacent that we think the good times that we enjoy now will always be, nor be so pessimistic that we think that no opportunities will exist in the future.

#### **MLBC**:

If you could offer advice to a young land professional, or peer, what would you say?

#### DR:

First, I would say always conduct yourself professionally and ethically. Reputation is everything to a land professional, and if it becomes tarnished it can be difficult, if not impossible to recover. If a landman works for an employer who requires unethical behavior, that landman needs to find a new employer, period!

Second, never stop learning. Land-work offers a wide array of disciplines: lease acquisition, titles, curative, right of way, damage settlements, due diligence, contracts, etc. Find ways to become acquainted, if not proficient in several areas. It will make you more marketable and your work more interesting.

Third, take advantage of your opportunities through MLBC and other organizations to meet and associate with others in the industry. In terms of people, the Appalachian oil patch is surprisingly small. As the years progress you will cross paths with your peers over and over. Good contacts will enhance your career opportunities and make you a better landman. Few, if any, of my jobs were not in some way associated with my contacts in the MLBC.

#### MLBC:

Are there any ways the MLBC can improve as an organization or by offering service to our members?

#### DR:

To be honest, I have not been intimately involved in the association in the last few years to recommend other offerings to the members. My sense is the MLBC provides numerous relevant social, educational and networking opportunities. It also appears that the current and past officers and leaders are young and bright professionals who will take advantage of new ideas and opportunities.

#### MLBC:

Who has been your biggest influence/mentor? Tell us about he or she.

#### DR:

I was blessed with many positive influences during my career. Two come to mind, both now deceased. The first is Bud Coffindaffer, Landman with Consolidated Gas. Bud taught me the value of hard work and treating landowners in a respectful and professional manner. The other is Tom Quinn, an MLBC's past president. Tom was a crusty old Irishman who taught me the advantages of using a sales approach in negotiation as well as turning my negatives into positives.

#### MI BC

How long have you been a member of the MLBC? How long have you held your CPL designation?

#### DR:

I have been a member of the MLBC and the national AAPL continually since 1974 and have held the CPL designation since the program was instituted in 1981. I have also been a member of the Energy and Mineral Law Foundation since 1980, serving as trustee and as the only non-lawyer President 1986-1987.

#### **MLBC**:

What are your plans for the future?

#### DR

I plan to continue enjoying my retirement. My wife and I keep busy with travel and friends as well as church and volunteer activities. But I also have time to reflect and reminisce on my wonderful life and career as a professional landman.


